TOO SICK TO COME TO SCHOOL?

Whilst we do want the children to attend school, we also want parents to continue to keep their children home if they are sick or displaying symptoms of Covid. There is a spike of Covid in the country and we currently have at least three children away from Blockhouse Bay School because they have tested positive, so please continue to be vigilant with regards to any illnesses that can be transmitted to others.

Principals Update: Government Educational Initiatives

In January, the Government informed schools of two initiatives that they wanted them to implement this year and I want to let everyone know what we are doing about these. In summary, very little of what we do at Blockhouse Bay School needs to change to fulfil our obligations regarding cell phones or teaching time allocations.

Use of Cell phones

The new Minister of Education, Erica Standford commented that

"New Zealand schools and overseas jurisdictions that have already imposed restrictions on cell phones in the classroom have reported better concentration and engagement in class, and an improvement in student achievement and wellbeing".

For more than 10 years, Blockhouse Bay School has had a policy whereby if children have a cell phone, they must hand them into the school office at the start of the day and then collect them at 3.00pm. This means that there is no need to change our current school policy.

Time Spent on Reading, Writing and Maths

During one of our teacher-only days in January, the teachers reviewed the 'One of hour of teaching reading, writing and maths' mandate that was sent to us during the summer break and considered this in regards to our 2024 timetables. We can confirm that our planned programmes provide regular daily focussed instruction in the core areas of reading, writing and maths both separately and across other learning areas.

The directive from the government was that "from the beginning of Term 1 2024, schools and kura with students in years 0-8 will spend an average of one hour a day teaching each reading, writing, and maths. This could be in dedicated lessons and in other learning areas as students read, write, and engage with maths in a variety of purposes and contexts.

Teachers will deliberately and purposefully dedicate time to teaching these core skills. Teaching techniques like investigations, collaborative learning, and games will continue to be used so students stay engaged with their learning.

This change sets a clear expectation that all year 0-8 students should receive regular, focussed instruction in these core areas. Many schools and kura are already teaching an hour of reading, writing, and maths each day."

We agree that having dedicated time for the children to learn in these areas is very important and are very pleased that we will also have the flexibility to carry out this learning, within integrated areas of study where it is appropriate. Parents and whānau will have seen evidence of this with our 2023 Term 4 learning about 'Papatūānuku is Breathing' culminating in our Science Fair. For this, children had to carry out reading and writing tasks in the learning areas of science and mathematics. Throughout the time spent in these areas of study, the children are also experiencing focused and targeted teaching in reading, writing and maths. One example of this targeted teaching is the Better Start Literacy Approach which we have been implementing at Blockhouse Bay School over the last 3 years.

In summary, the Government has every right to instruct schools on how its education policies will be implemented and Blockhouse Bay School will continue to follow these directives.

ATTENDANCE AT SCHOOL

At Blockhouse Bay School we want every child to leave our school soaring and ready for their next stage of learning. To help our children soar in their learning it is very important that they come to school every day unless they are sick. We want to partner with you to help all your children attend school happily and successfully.

As you are aware all students are legally required to attend school every day and it is a shared responsibility to make sure students attend and engage in learning from when they first start school. As we enter 2024, we want to highlight that **every day of school matters**.

If a student misses one day of school every two weeks throughout their schooling, this adds up to missing a whole year of school by the time they are 16 years of age. As a parent or caregiver, you, alongside our school, play a key role in building strong habits of regular school attendance.

Absences from school

We ask you to let the school know via the Hero app, school absence line or via email if your child is going to be absent for a day or intends to be absent for a portion of the school term for whatever reason, such as a funeral, tangi or medical procedure.

We also need to let you know that the Ministry of Education has advised that family holidays or taking time off for extracurricular activities (not organised by school) are not considered acceptable reasons for being absent. Whilst we as a school accept that there can be strong reasons to take these times away, if they happen often, especially in the early years, they can have a significant impact on children's learning and engagement with their peers.

NZ Police, assisted by Community Patrols are providing a crime prevention initiative called "Operation Safer Plates"

The purpose of this initiative is to make it harder and less likely for offenders to target your vehicle for the purpose of acquiring your registration plates.

Stolen number plates are currently being used for evading detection when offenders are committing offences, such as:

- Petrol drive offs
